5) *A Conversation With a Justice Champion: Judicial Appointments Secretary Justice Martin Jenkins Interviews Judge Thelton E. Henderson “Soul of Justice”*

When it comes to due process, equal protection and social justice, Judge Thelton E. Henderson is peerless. In this plenary session, Judicial Appointments Secretary, Justice Martin Jenkins, will conduct a wide-ranging interview with a remarkable jurist and attorney who has championed transformative justice for nearly four decades. The first black attorney in the Civil Rights Division of the U.S. Department of Justice, Judge Henderson was sent to the South to monitor law enforcement for civil rights abuses, including the investigation of the 1963 16th Street Baptist Church bombing which killed four girls. Judge Henderson was appointed to the federal bench by President Jimmy Carter in 1980. Judge Henderson’s remarkable ability and willingness to protect the vulnerable among us in his decisions on affirmative action, environmental protection, marriage equality, racial justice and prison reform in California are a legacy of protecting due process and equal protection.

Justice Martin Jenkins was tapped by Gov. Gavin Newsom in 2019 to help shape California’s future judiciary as the Judicial Appointment Secretary. In 1989, Gov. George Deukmejian appointed him to the Oakland Municipal Court, and three years later, Gov. Pete Wilson appointed him to the Alameda County Superior

Court. Justice Jenkins was appointed by President Bill Clinton to the bench on the U. S. District Court for California’s Northern District in 1997 and served for 11 years. In 2008, Gov. Arnold Schwarzenegger appointed Justice Jenkins as an associate justice on the First District Court of Appeal where he served for 10 years. Justice Jenkins has devoted his life to public service and is involved in numerous civic, religious and charitable organizations serving youth. He says that humility is one of the most important attributes to look for in applicants for judgeship.

Judge Henderson and Justice Jenkins will discuss the complex relationship between justice and the law in polarizing times while each of us remain impartial in the face of threats to judicial independence.

9) *The Fred Korematsu Case: Lasting Relevance and Parallels to Modern Times*

Seventy-five years ago, Fred Korematsu, a 23-year old American stood up to an injustice and defied executive order 9066 that led to the imprisonment of approximately 120,000 Japanese Americans after the bombing of Pearl Harbor. In the infamous case of *Korematsu v. United States*, the Supreme Court deferred to the government's assertions that military necessity justified its racially discriminatory policies. Legal proceedings that led to Korematsu's conviction being vacated in 1983 underscored the gravity of the Court's abdication when secret WWII-era intelligence reports and Justice Department memoranda surfaced admitting that Japanese Americans had committed no wrong and posed no threat. On June 26, 2018, the Supreme Court officially overruled *Korematsu v. United States* in the case of *Trump v. Hawaii*. Though the majority opinion in *Trump v. Hawaii* declared Korematsu to be "gravely wrong" and to have "no place in law under the Constitution," the Court proceeded ironically to reinforce one of its most dangerous elements by allowing the government's invocation of national security to shield it from any judicial inquiry verifying whether the Travel Ban barring entry of people from Muslim-majority nations has any basis in fact or reason. In this session, we will explore the lasting legacy of Fred Korematsu, the relevance of the Korematsu decision today, and the parallels to modern times. Come hear from one of the attorneys who reopened the landmark Supreme Court case overturning Fred Korematsu's conviction, as well as an author and a filmmaker whose works have chronicled the history of this seminal case.
